
3. d. Agree the number of members that may be appointed to the Trustee Board



Trustees Report



Reporting Period: 6th April 2024 – 5th April 2025

The Trustee Board met regularly throughout the year to oversee the governance, financial health, and strategic direction of the Group. The meetings were well-attended and productive, with a strong focus on safety, financial planning, and future development.

Governance & Trustee Board

- The Trustee Board was set at max of 10 members, including the Chair, Treasurer, and GLV as ex officio roles.
- A rolling trustee programme was discussed to ensure continuity and engagement.

Finance

- Fundraising and donations increased compared to the previous year.
- Gift Aid income rose, though it remains variable.
- Badge spending increased due to changes in purchasing methods.
- Utility costs decreased thanks to refunds and energy efficiency measures.
- Barclays accounts were closed, and financial procedures are under review.
- Trustees agreed to present a subs breakdown graph at the AGM for transparency.
- A 3–5 year strategic plan was initiated, focusing on leadership gaps and result-driven goals.

Health & Safety

- A Scout Safe Premises Audit was completed, with follow-up actions planned.
- A fire risk assessment was conducted, and emergency lighting installation is pending due to wiring issues.
- Trustees reviewed and adjusted the Risk Register, focusing on building deterioration and leadership recruitment.
- Trustees agreed to install CCTV, following unsuccessful grant applications to help building security and insurance.
- A review of all insurance policies was conducted.

GLV Business & Group Activities

- The Group Camp and Packmoor Community Event were highly successful, raising over £450 and strengthening community ties.
- Bingo night and Santa run were well received.
- Building insurance was moved to Unity for better coverage.
- Grant applications for various projects are ongoing.
- The group now has access to OS Maps for DoE activities.

Extension Project

- Builders quotes were received, larger building firms did not respond.
- The Lottery grant application is on hold due to scheme updates.
- Trustees agreed to self-fund the foundations before planning permission expires in April 2026, with phased development to follow.

Looking Ahead

- Continued focus on leadership recruitment and retention.
- Strategic planning to support sustainable growth.
- Ongoing efforts to improve premises safety and accessibility.
- Strengthening community engagement through events and partnerships.



59th Newchapel Annual Finance Report April 24-April 25

59th Newchapel Scout Group

Overview

The 2024–2025 financial year has been a successful and stable period for the Group, marked by growth in membership, increased fundraising, and significant improvements to our premises. Our financial position remains strong, with total funds increasing from £57,677 to £72,438.

Receipts

Total income for the year was £49,146, up from £43,216 in the previous year. Key sources of income included:

- Membership Fees: £19,139 (↑ from £16,056)
- Fundraising: £5,405 (↑ from £1,928)
- Events Income: £12,404 (↓ slightly from £13,478)
- Gift Aid: £4,141
- Grants Received: £1,985 (↑ from £1,250)
- Donations: £3,033

We also received restricted bank interest income of £1,371, contributing to the growth of our reserves.

Payments

Total expenditure was £34,385, up from £28,281 last year. Major costs included:

- Events: £11,815
- Insurance: £3,487
- Utilities: £3,060
- HQ Membership Fees: £5,616
- Extension Costs: £2,840
- Venue Maintenance: £962
- Badges and Clothing: £1,223


The increase in spending reflects our investment in improving facilities and supporting a growing membership base.

Net Position

- Net Receipts: £14,761
- Cash Funds at Year-End: £72,438
 - Unrestricted Funds: £20,865
 - Restricted Funds: £51,573

This represents a healthy financial position, with unrestricted reserves exceeding the six-month operating cost requirement as per Scout POR policy.

Reserves and Accounts



We continue to maintain a prudent reserves policy. The unrestricted funds of £20,865 are sufficient to cover operational needs. Restricted funds are allocated to specific projects, including the Extension Fund, which now holds £51,573 across various savings accounts.

Grants and Fundraising

We are grateful for the support received from:

- Bentley (£500)
- Potteries North DI (£260)
- Stoke City Council (£475)
- William A. Cadbury Trust (£750)

Fundraising efforts such as the Christmas raffle, community events, and election venue hire have significantly contributed to our income.

Events and Activities

The Group hosted a successful Group Camp and expanded its programme to include a Squirrel section. Event income and expenditure were well balanced, with a total of £12,404 received and £11,815 spent.

Conclusion

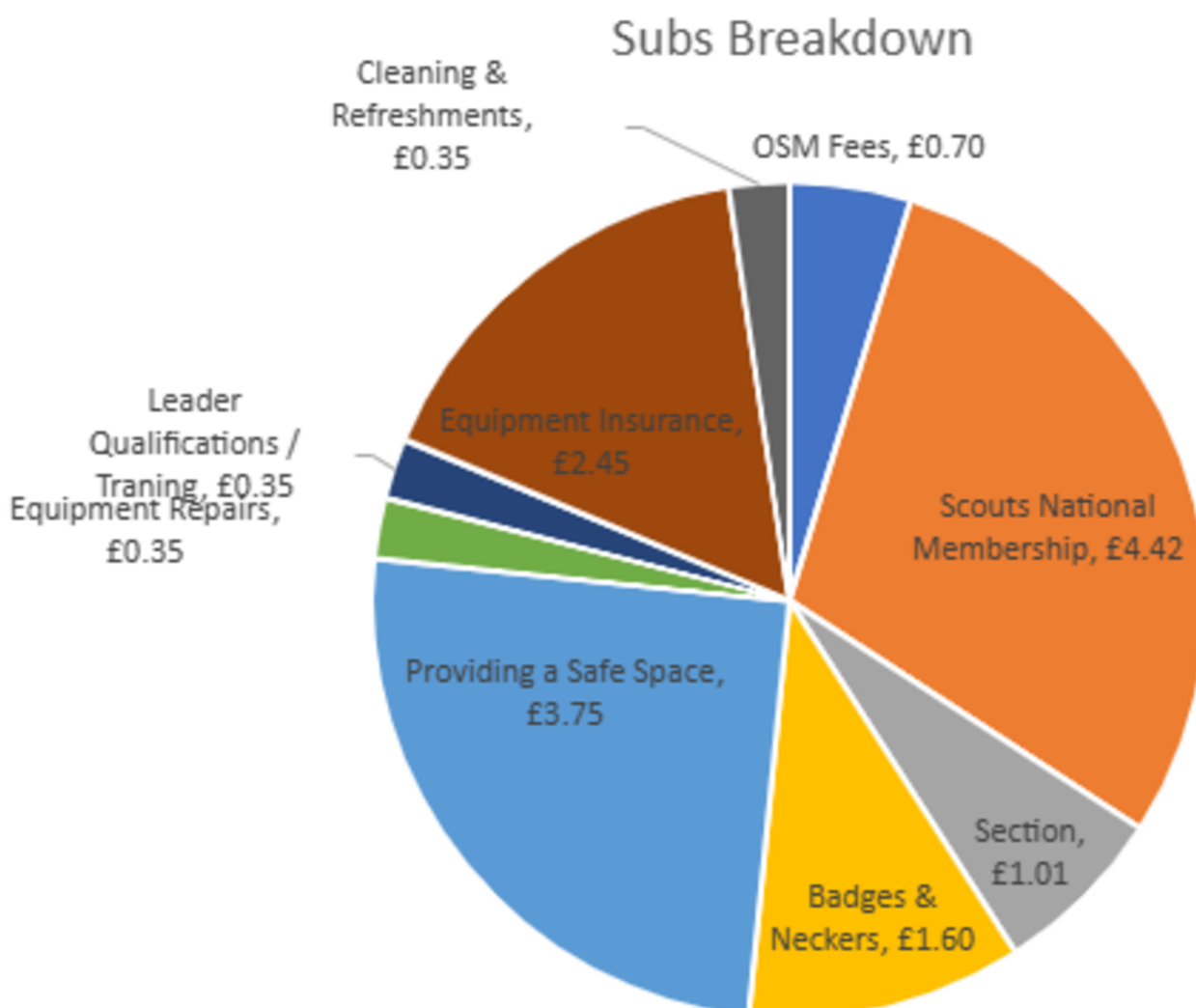
The Group remains in a strong financial position, with increased income, responsible spending, and growing reserves. We are well-placed to continue supporting our young people and investing in our facilities and programmes.

The diagram below shows the breakdown of where your subscription payments go to each month.



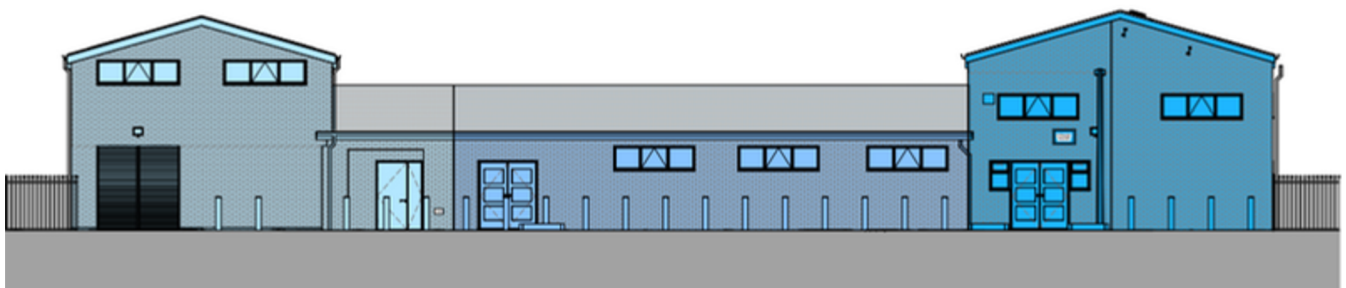
Building our new Extension

You may have heard about the Groups plans for a new extension to our building. The extension includes building onto the garage to create a much larger space for storage of the kit we own. We currently do not have enough space to store everything we own.

The second part of the extension, will see a new extended entrance, with better and more inclusive toilets (including a disabled toilet). The stairs will also be redone, making them safer to use and bringing them inline with current regulations. There will also be additional storage and meeting space upstairs.

Group Lead Volunteers Report

The 2024-2025 year has been incredibly busy and progressive for 59th Newchapel Scout Group, and this document serves to highlight the key achievements and milestones from the past twelve months. It has been a year of building - not just with bricks and mortar, but also of skills, young talent, and community spirit.

Speaking of building, arguably the most significant development of the year has been the monumental progress made on our long-awaited headquarters extension. This project, funded through decades of diligent fundraising by past and present members, has finally moved from a dream to a reality. This year, we undertook the critical preparatory work: securing multiple quotes from building firms, appointing a contractor, and finalising all architectural and structural drawings. We are therefore thrilled to announce that as we hold this AGM, the foundation work for the first phase has already begun. Seeing the ground being broken is a truly exciting moment, and we owe a huge debt of gratitude to everyone whose efforts over the years have made this possible.

While the extension has been our flagship project, we have also continued to improve our existing facilities. The installation of a comprehensive CCTV system is a fantastic step forward for security, and the new Hive heating gives us much greater control over our energy consumption. Thanks to a generous donation, we also received new hand dryers for our bathrooms, and we are currently looking for a qualified electrician who might volunteer their time to help us with the installation. These improvements and projects are only possible through careful financial management. We are particularly pleased that the rewards of swapping energy providers last year have allowed us to absorb the £5 per-head increase in the national membership fee, meaning we could keep our monthly subscriptions frozen for all our young people.

Our ability to fund our work is also a testament to incredible fundraising support from our members and the community. This year's events, including the ever-popular bingo, quiz nights, and the annual Santa Run, were all resounding successes, with our raffle alone raising an incredible sum of over £2,000! We were also fortunate to receive a donation from a local councillor, be featured in the Tesco blue token scheme, and benefit financially by having our building used as a polling station.

Of course, the heart of our group is the adventure and skills for life we offer our young people. A major highlight this year was our biennial Group Camp, a triumph planned and executed primarily by our fantastic Explorer Scout unit and Georgia Timbey. It was a particularly special occasion as we welcomed our Squirrels to their very first 59th Group Camp! Across the sections, we have been as active as ever, taking part in the 'Outdoor in 24' challenge and the national Jambowlree bowling event.

This vibrant programme is only possible because our leaders are constantly developing their own skills, and we've seen plenty of new activity permits gained this year. Furthermore, we successfully secured £1,700 in grants to revamp our upstairs meeting room, upgrade lighting,

and purchase more watersports equipment.

This commitment to skills development provides the foundation for our young people to achieve incredible things. On that note, we must extend a huge congratulations to Georgia Timbey on achieving her King's Scout Award. This is the highest youth award in Scouting and the culmination of years of hard work and dedication; a truly outstanding achievement. Alongside these visible successes, we have also completed significant work behind the scenes, including navigating the challenging migration to the Scout's new digital management system. It was a bumpy road, but we made it through.

None of the progress outlined in this report would be possible without our team of volunteers. We want to extend our sincerest thanks to our Section Team Leads and Team Members, who volunteer their time week after week with boundless enthusiasm. Our thanks also go to the Group Trustee Board, who work tirelessly to manage the group's finances, facilities, and governance. And finally, thank you to the parents and guardians. Thank you for your continued support, for being a taxi service, for sewing on the badges, for supporting our fundraising, and for entrusting us with your children. They are a credit to you, and their energy is what makes all of this worthwhile.

As we look to the year ahead, we are filled with excitement for what is to come, especially watching the first phase of our new extension take shape.

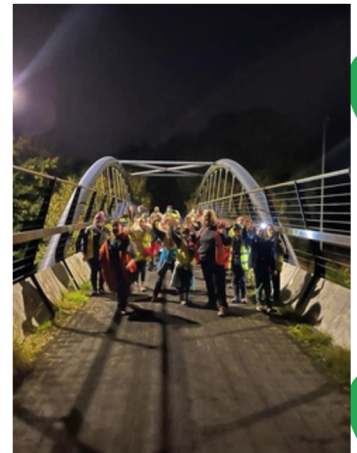

SCOUTS

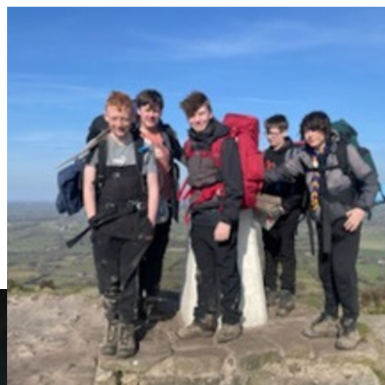
First a big thank you to the leaders and young leaders for their support. We gained a new leader in Jack Timbey.

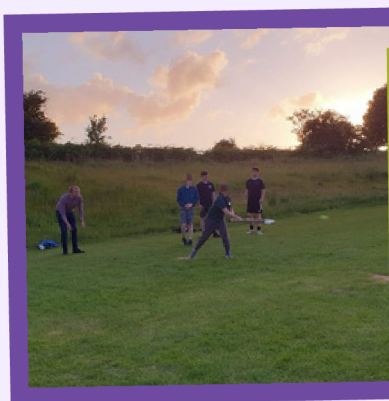
